Some countries have a guaranteed minimum income, which is where the government gives money to people who fail one or more means tests. What I'd like to suggest is a basic income. 



Global warming is real

Global warming is a term that is used to describe the increase in the world's temperature, namely in the atmosphere and in the oceans. This change is believed to be permanent.

While some people don't believe in global warming, the scientific community at large is in agreement that not only is global warming real, it is also man made. Current data shows that the average global temperature has risen about 1 degree over the last 100 years. Additionally, all but one of the 16 hottest years in NASA's 134-year record have occurred since 2000.

The causes of this temperature increase are beloved to be carbon dioxide (CO_2) and other greenhouse gases that are released when fossil fuels are burned. The two biggest contributors to this in the USA are burning fossil fuels to generate electricity and the CO_2 emissions from the transport sector.

These gasses collect in the atmosphere and stop sunlight and solar radiation that has bounced off the Earth's surface. Normally, these would just continue off into space, but the gasses trap the heat and cause the planet to get hotter - just like a greenhouse. That's why this is commonly referred to as the greenhouse effect. Another cause is the clearing of forests for logging, housing, and agriculture, which results in fewer trees available to absorb carbon dioxide.

Some of the effects are already becoming apparent with Glacier National Park's famous ice formations losing more than a third of their area between 1966 and 2015.

In addition, because the Earth is getting hotter, it means that tropical storms can pick up more energy and increase in power. This is supported by data as scientists have found that since the 1980's the number of category 4 and 5 storms has already increased. Scientists are predicting, based on current trends, that the global temperature could rise over 10 degrees in the next 100 years. If that happens, it could pose a big threat to life as we know it.

Water is the most vital substance in the natural world. Both humans and animals need water to survive. Humans can't survive more than a couple of days without water. We are currently unable to mass produce additional water, we can only use available supplies and harvest additional water reserves when it rains. Additionally, as populations increase so do demands on the water supply. To make sure we always have a plentiful supply of water, we need to focus on four equally important points.

Conservation

It's estimated that the average person in the UK uses about 3,400 liters of water every day. Only a fraction of this amount comes from daily cooking and drinking, which is usually around 20 liters. The majority of the water usage comes from "hidden usage". For example, a whopping 840 liters goes into one cup of coffee when you take into account all the water that was used to grow, manufacture and transport the beans. In order to meet this growing demand, we need more public awareness about how to conserve water and the benefits of doing so. I suggest reinforcing the importance of water conservation from an early age through schooling programs.

Creation

We can currently create water. It's extremely easy to do so. All you need to do is mix hydrogen gas, oxygen gas, and a spark. But using this method results in an explosion. The more water you make at once, the bigger the explosion. It's not practical to use the current method to create water in large quantities due to the danger and high costs. We need to invest time and money into technology that allows us to safely and artificially create our own water in large quantities.

Prevention

A large amount of both the fresh water and salt water available on the planet is polluted. Water pollution is a major cause of various diseases like cholera and typhoid. Water pollution is caused when pollutants are added to the water supply, through, for example, improper garbage disposal. In America, approximately 40% of the lakes and rivers are considered unhealthy for swimming, or fishing due to high pollution levels. We need to work with the government and private companies to create policies that can be put in place to protect our natural water reserves and keep them free from pollution.

Treatment

We currently have the technology available that allows us to purify dirty water and desalinate sea water, but we need to work with governments and companies to make this technology cheaper and more widely available so that everyone can have access to clean drinking water.

I'm confident that if we can change the culture to put a bigger emphasis on the importance of water and consider the four topics above we will always have enough water for everyone and no one will ever have to go thirsty.





Our rising population

In the 1970's the global population was around three billion people, and the population has risen by 1 billion people approximately every 10 years since, hitting six billion in the year 2000. Based on this model, some people expect the global population to surpass 10 billion people by the year 2100. Some people are worried that a population that never stops growing could lead to wars, mass migration, or a lack of resources.

Will the population ever stop growing? The short answer is "yes".

The theory "Demographic transition" proposed by Warren Thompson shows that based on statistics, we can see that a high birth rate isn't a permanent feature of a country, but in fact a temporary one. All countries go through a four stage growth model that eventually results in a stable population.

First stage - in this stage, which takes place in a pre-industrial age, births are high, but so are deaths, which results in a stable population. People have large families because only 2/5 children make it to adulthood.

Second stage - this stage takes place during an industrial revolution. Thanks to improvements in hygiene, food supplies, and medicine, people live longer and the death rate decreases, which leads to a population explosion.

Third stage - in this stage, population growth slows down since people are now having fewer kids thanks to the falling infant mortality rate.

Fourth stage - in this stage, the population growth becomes stable. The birth rate is lower because people have more opportunities to choose if they want to have children. This is made possible by improvements in contraceptives and women gaining more independence in the workforce.

Many countries have already reached stage four. Most notably, the United States, Canada, Australia, the majority of Europe, South Korea, and Singapore.

So we can see that although the world's population is rising at the moment, it won't continue rising forever, and once all countries have reached stage four, the global population will stabilize.

There are four subspecies of gorillas: the western lowland gorilla, the cross river gorilla, the mountain gorilla, and the eastern lowland gorilla. Sadly, they are all endangered. There are estimated to be only 220,000 gorillas in the wild. Fully-grown male mountain gorillas can weigh up to 180 kg, while females usually weigh about 90 kg. Mountain gorillas live in groups called "troops". Each troop usually contains up to 30 gorillas and is usually lead by an alpha male silverback.

Let's look at four reasons why gorillas are endangered.

1. Habitat destruction

The gorilla has few natural predators, but their close proximity to humans has lead to a loss of numbers caused by human encroachment and habitat destruction. Commercial activities like farming, agriculture, and mining cut down trees necessary for gorillas which affects both where they live and their food supply. For example, charcoal harvesting inside the Virunga National Park has lead to a large gorilla habitat being destroyed.

2. Poaching

While there is not a large amount of direct poaching of adult gorillas, gorillas are still frequently injured by traps set for other animals. Additionally, baby gorillas are captured and illegally sold as pets or research subjects. Poaching has been made easier thanks to human encroachment as building roads and clearing trees have made access to gorillas easier than ever. Since gorillas have such a complex social structure, and females only reproduce every four years, the removal of even a few gorillas from a troop can have very severe effects.

3. Armed conflicts

Armed conflicts, like those going on in the Democratic Republic of the Congo affect the gorillas as well. Even though the gorillas are not targeted in the conflict, the war zones reduce the areas in which gorillas can travel safely.

4. Diseases

Since Gorillas as so biologically similar to humans, they are constantly at risk of catching infectious diseases. Mountain Gorillas can even die from the common cold. Ebola is also a major threat to the western lowland gorilla. By 2003 1/3 of all wild gorillas had been killed due to Ebola. Diseases like polio, hepatitis A, and tuberculosis also pose a constant risk to the gorilla population.



Changing China

In the short span of 20 years, China has gone through some incredible changes. China has seen an 8.5X increase in the per capita income, as well as a 66% reduction in absolute poverty. The life expectancy has increased from 71 years to 75 years. The number of citizens covered by a basic pension has increased by over 150 million, and citizens covered by medical insurance has increased from 37.9 million to a whopping 432.6 million.

China has also seen a change from rural to urban living with more than 50% of the populace now residing in urban areas. Additionally, China now has over 100 cities with a population of over 1 million people. China's total urban population now exceeds 700 million people and comprises approximately 10% of the population of the entire world.

China's ever growing population has now exceeded 1.3 billion people. Although the country has a birth rate of 1.56 (down from 6.3 in 1965), the country shows no signs of slowing down its population growth. Additionally, since the introduction of the one child policy in 2010, China now has many more males than females, with 120 males for every 100 females. This imbalance means that sadly some men might never be able to marry.

Infrastructure in China has been changing too, with China now boasting the world's largest number of expressways, as well as the largest high speed rail network, plus engineering marvels like the Qinghai–Tibet railway, which includes the world's highest station at 5,068 m.

Global warming has had an effect on China as well, as the inland temperate of China rose 0.9 - 1.5 degrees in the last 100 years, in addition to the nearshore sea level rising 2.9 mm in last the last 30 years. China is now the number one greenhouse gas emitter. However, they are moving in the right direction, as there have been numerous initiatives to combat global warming, including a 50% reduction in carbon intensity and a 32% increase in forest cover since 1992

Finally, let's look at how technology has changed in China. In 2000, the amount of computers owned by 1,000 people was only 32, but that rose to 555 in 2015, and continues to rise each year. Now, more than 50% of people have a computer in their house. The amount of Chinese people online is growing every year too. In 2016, the number of Chinese Internet users grew by 43 million which is equivalent to the entire population of Argentina.



Ethical business practices

Essentially, business ethics can be thought of as a set of beliefs a company follows in order to conduct business responsibly. In the short-term, ethical practices can result in increased costs and lower profits, but it's generally accepted that in the long-term, ethical practices will produce beneficial results for a business.

Ethics addresses the scope of responsibilities and obligations that an organization has to each of its stakeholders, which can encompass everyone from clients, to employees, to the community at large. Ethics influences all aspects of an organization, but most notably, finance, human resources management, sales and marketing, production, international business, and intellectual property. The size of the company shouldn't affect how ethical its decision making is as we have seen behemoths like Enron and Lehman Brothers quickly fail due to unethical business practices.

Running an ethical business has multiple benefits that can be broken down into two main categories:

Improved sale

When running an ethical business, you can expect to see an increase in sales due to customer retention. More and more customers are choosing to spend their money on goods and services that come from companies that have a reputation for ethical practices.

This theme also applies to investment. Large scale investment is usually subject to market forces which are in turn largely affected by public opinion. If a company has a reputation for unethical business practices, they might experience problems with investment as many investors don't want to be associated with a company which has a reputation for being unethical.

Improved workforce

People like working somewhere where they feel trusted, cared for, and valued. By having ethical human resource management practices in place, a company can reduce staff turnover, attract new staff, and maximize productivity.

Another benefit is strength in a crisis. Studies have shown that companies with strong ethical practices fare better in crises as managers are able to rely on their moral compasses when they are dealing with new and complex conflicts which they were unprepared for.

When a company is able to combine ethics into its DNA and create a culture where people look to make the right decision time and time again, the chances for continued success increase greatly.

The Unequal subcontinent

- Brian Smith

India has one of the highest income inequality gaps in the world. Every day, the rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer with the wealthiest 10% of the Indians owning over 80% of the country's wealth. Sadly, this trend shows no sign of slowing down as the IMF reported that India's Gini coefficient rose from 45% in 1990 to 51% in 2013.

The Gini coefficient shows how equal wealth is distributed in a country, with "0%" showing perfect equality, i.e. everyone has the same amount of money, and "100%" reflecting complete inequality, i.e. one person has all the money in the country. For comparison, the Gini coefficient of the USA is 46.1%. Currently, in terms of wealth, the most equal country in the world is Japan with millionaires controlling only 22% of total wealth.

Rising inequality will lead to slower poverty reduction, undermine the sustainability of economic growth, compound the inequalities between men and women, and drive inequalities in health, education, and life chances. Economic inequality is associated with a range of health and social problems, such as mental illness and violent crime. This is true across both rich and poor countries.

Let's explore the causes and impact of income inequality in India. First, food production is going down due to a poor agriculture system. Second, India's poor social safety-net systems like welfare, homeless shelters, healthcare, and unemployment insurance are not readily available for the people in need. Third, urban India is experiencing a boom, while rural India is getting left behind with power and road transport facilities in a poor state. Fourth, the Indian government has come under criticism for their pro-corporate and anti-poor policies that cut funds to education, health, and other services that could reduce income inequality.

Some of the people who are hit the hardest are those working in the unorganized sector, which is characterized by low wages, long hours, and lack of basic services like drinking water and sanitation. To address the growing problem of income inequality, India will need to spend more money on social services such as health, education, and social protection as well as introduce a progressive taxation system where richer individuals and companies will be required to pay a higher amount of tax. If India can make progress in these three areas, it will be on its way to improving not only the income gap, but the country itself.

The Taronga Western Plains Zoo, located in Dubbo, Australia allows for a totally new zoo experience. We visited the zoo with our ten-year-old twins and my parents. All of us had a blast! 




