There are many different martial arts around the world. Each has a different style, different traditions, and different techniques, but all martial arts are good exercise.

Wrestling comes from ancient Greece. Wrestling has a long history. There are paintings of wrestling from 15,000 years ago, and it was one of the sports in the original Olympic Games. Wrestling is a martial art for two competitors. There are no strikes, but there are many grappling techniques. The opponents compete to pin each other to the mat, but they can't kick or punch each other.

Another form of wrestling is sumo. Sumo comes from Japan, and it also has a long history. Professional sumo matches started in 1684. Sumo is a very competitive sport. Two wrestlers, called "Rikishi" in Japanese, try to push each other out of the ring or on to the floor. Sumo wrestlers are very big and strong. They grapple powerfully with their opponents and they train very hard every day. Also, sumo wrestlers like eating "Chanko Nabe", a kind of stew made with lots of different ingredients.

Boxing is a western martial art. It also comes from ancient Greece, but the modern rules were first written down in Britain in 1867. Boxers wear padded gloves on their hands, and they fight inside a square ring. Boxers can use their fists to punch each other, but they can't kick, grapple or throw. Also, they can't wear any kind of armor or use any weapons. Amateur boxing matches are usually decided on points, but professional matches sometimes end with a knockout.

Fencing originally comes from Spain, but the rules for modern fencing come from Italy. Fencing is a modern Olympic sport. Two competitors wear full body <u>armor</u> and compete to <u>strike each other</u> with a long, light sword. There are three kinds of swords in modern Olympic fencing: the foil, the épée and the sabre. The épée is heavier than the foil or the sabre.

I really like to watch MMA (Mixed Martial Arts). In MMA matches, you can usually use any martial art you like, so it's a good way to prove which martial art is better. Lots of MMA fighters train in multiple martial arts. Brazilian Jui-Jutsu is popular for MMA fighters because it has lots of good grappling techniques, and Muay Thai is also popular due to it's amazing striking techniques.


